City Council Edges Closer To Skate Park Approval

Two blacked out meetings in October left a large agenda and a long night for the Colfax City Council at its only November meeting on the 13th. Mayor Pro-Tem Mendoza was not present.

The evening's biggest crowd was there for the item proposing a location for a Colfax skate park. Opponents read the item's agenda description – "Approving locating the Colfax Skate Park adjacent to the Splash Park" – as a final vote on the issue. Lengthy discussion ensued over missing soil and drainage engineering data that could negatively impact choosing the old pool location.

The item closed after the council agreed to have the resolution re-written to reflect that the final decision on the proposed location will be subject to engineering studies and completing the standard permit process.

Before addressing the agenda's cannabis item, the council quickly passed permanently changing the regular meeting time to 6:00 p.m., and donating \$1,000 from the city to the Colfax Chamber of Commerce for Winterfest with unanimous votes.

The cannabis item asked the

council to provide direction to staff regarding expanding the scope of commercial cannabis activity in Colfax to allow 'microbusinesses.' The state defines a microbusiness as providing at least three of four activities: retail, cultivation, distribution and delivery.

No one spoke against the item, and its several proponents'

main argument in favor was that a microbusiness reduces costs for the retailer and the customer.

The council directed staff to schedule a public workshop on Wednesday, December 11 at 11:00 a.m. to consider making potential changes to the existing Colfax commercial cannabis ordinance.

City of Colfax Rolls Out Its New Brand

The City of Colfax California has updated its brand to reflect both its history and growth.

Colfax has the heart of a railroad town, but is also full of places for outdoor exploration and living history events, such as its Annual Railroad Days, Third of July and Winterfest.

The new brand was established with the input of City, community and local government representatives along with public input. Solace Graphics and Thumler Agency worked with committee members to brand Colfax's efforts as it grows and adds new businesses.

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The Mayor's Corner

Colfax has had FOUR power outages over a period of 21 days starting in October 2019. We were out for 216+ hours and some residents were out for up to seven days. During the first outage everything was down within about a 20-mile radius of Colfax.

Residents and businesses suffered losses in many areas, and I-80 travelers had no place to go for services, potentially stranding more people in Colfax.

The communications infrastructure – phones and Internet – relied on by all of our emergency services failed.

The lessons are clear: if power blackouts are the new normal then PG&E and all of the state, county and city agencies need to rethink how to handle these events.

So, what has the City of Colfax done for you?

1. We have declared a State of Emergency, opening an avenue to funds from the County and State.
2. We have requested specific funding for providing generators for the Sierra Vista Community Center, for the VFW Center, and for City Hall. This will give us three potential places where people could recharge devices, get warmed up, have a cup of coffee, and potentially house people overnight in cold temperatures.
3. We have met with the County of Placer Board of Supervisors to highlight the plight that Colfax has experienced. We specifically asked that they harden the communications infrastructure.
4. Mayor Pro Tem Marnie Mendoza and I volunteered to drive my truck (which has a built in generator) or my RV which also has one to anyone's home to give them some power to recharge devices or chill a fridge where they might be storing medications on a 24x7 basis.
5. We had PG&E provide 1,000 box lunches which were distributed at the Sierra Vista Community Center and various other organizations and churches in the area. We had some people come to the community center in tears (of joy) that they could get something to eat. A special note of thanks goes out to all of the volunteers who helped distribute this food.
6. Council member Sean Lomen provided a generator for the senior apartments and refueled it every two hours – 24x7 during the events.
7. Council member Trinity Bures arranged a 'Trunk or Treat' event to provide some relief for the residents.
8. Council member Kim Douglass coordinated getting available generators to where they were needed.
9. We increased checking on the sewer pumping stations throughout the city as the generators in each were now the primary source of power.
10. We had PG&E move the Customer Response Center from Lincoln where there were no outages to Colfax (for event #5). They had lights, a heated tent, about 30 charging stations, hot coffee, and some snacks ready to go. It was located behind the Freight Depot on Main St.
11. We are looking into the costs and potential sources of funding to see if it is possible to have a local 10MW generator to power up the entire city during future blackout events.
12. Marnie is focusing on another effort called CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) – to get Colfax volunteers trained on disaster preparedness and propagate this along the I-80 corridor from north of Auburn to Truckee.
13. We are in the process of trying to get Colfax's power line hardening schedule moved up to minimize the impacts to Colfax and the surrounding area when blackouts occur. This is budgeted in PG&E's 10-year plan and we would like it moved into the near future.
14. We have met with many county and other city officials to pool thoughts and ideas on how to address future blackouts.
15. We are in the process of sending out a survey to all residents and businesses to get an accurate assessment of the losses. Part of our goal is to try to get some recovery for these losses or at least make the County and State aware. When you get the survey you will need to clearly identify all of your losses from these events. You may want to file a claim with PG&E, which will probably be denied but provides another piece of documentation of the loss. You can save this information to give to your tax professional at the end of the year.

At their November 13th meeting, the City Council honored Deputy Manny Temorez for outstanding service to the greater Colfax community.


A proclamation noted the Council's appreciation for Temorez' proactive approach to law enforcement as well as his comitment to the safety of the entire community.

FIREPLACE SAFETY

Winter is here and many of us are enjoying our fireplaces. Directenergy.com recommends the following steps to ensure a safe and warm winter.

- Don't use chemicals. Fire and chemicals don't mix! Never use gasoline, kerosene, or charcoal starter. Don't burn painted, pressure-treated, or plywood. These can give off a whole slew of toxic chemicals that could enter your living space.
- Avoid using wet, rotten, diseased, or moldy wood. Only start fires with dry kindling, newspaper, or pinecones. Pinecones contain natural resins that burn quickly and are hot enough to ignite firewood. Dry wood also burns more completely than wet.
- Check the moisture content. Moisture content determines how much creosote will form in your chimney. Use wood that has been seasoned for 12 months and has a moisture content of less than 20%. Firewood moisture meters are available from most home centers.
- Only use local firewood. This prevents the spread of tree diseases and insect pests to your neighborhood. The emerald ash borer has killed 50 million ash trees in the US just by being moved around in firewood.
- Store your wood properly. When you buy firewood, store it for use next year. That way, you can be sure it's properly dried. Store your freshly cut and stacked firewood off the ground. Keep it covered on top but leave the side open for air to circulate.

More Invasive *Aedes aegypti* Mosquitos Found In Placer County

Following the discovery of two more invasive *Aedes aegypti* mosquitos in Placer County, the Placer Mosquito Vector Control District board of trustees unanimously approved increased funding to meet this serious public safety threat.

Aedes aegypti is a vector for Yellow Fever and the Zika Virus.

The two latest discoveries occurred Oct. 30 and Nov. 1, just across the line from Citrus Heights close to where the first two were found. This makes a total of four invaders confirmed.

The discoveries also prompted the district to begin planning a new program of surveillance and control that will have to be

- Choose the right wood. Different types of wood burn differently. Oak and other hard woods generally burn long and hot. Soft woods, like pine, will burn fiercely hot but very fast. If soft woods are not properly dried, the water content in their resins can release high amounts of creosote.
- Keep your fireplace clean. This allows better air flow and cleaner combustion. Wood burning fireplaces emit 28 lbs. of particulate emissions (soot and ash) per MMBtus (1 million BTUs) of heat output.
- Always keep a fire extinguisher handy. A single spark can start a house fire, so it's best to be prepared.

"It creates a new dynamic in the management of our operations," said district manager, Joel Buettner. "Over the winter staff will develop a short-term and longer-term plan to allow us to meet our ongoing operational

responsibilities, as well as dealing with this invasive threat."

The plan Buettner asked the trustees to approve included:

- Creating a second Lead Vector Control Technician position assigned to mosquito surveillance.
- Hiring up to five additional seasonal Vector Control Assistants.
- Backfilling up to three vacant Vector Control Technician positions as needed and at the discretion of the general manager.
