## Marnie Mendoza Takes Mayor's Gavel

At 2019's last city council meeting on Dec. 11, Mayor Joe Fatula handed his gavel to Mayor Pro-Tem Marnie Mendoza after a 5-0 vote in favor of her becoming the new Mayor of Colfax. Sean Lomen received the same unanimous support to become the city's Mayor Pro-Tem.

Mayor Mendoza was elected to office in 2018, and has served two terms as Mayor Pro-Tem. Lomen was also elected in 2018 and is entering his second year in office.

### In other council business:

- The council unanimously authorized the city manager to enter into a one-year contract with Solace Graphics/Thumblr with an option for a second year for \$12,440. The contract will be phase two of a rebranding effort that will develop a marketing campaign to promote the city and surrounding area via its new brand. (see related story on page 10)

- The council voted unanimously to allow the storage of antique fire trucks on city property. A previous council had donated a 1936 Dodge and 1946 International fire engines to the Colfax Firefighter Associ-

## Colfax Lions Donate Hundreds of Reading Glasses to Northern Madagascar

The Colfax Lions Club has just shipped its second batch of 250 reading glasses to the Northern Madagascar one of the ten poorest countries in the world in 2019 according to USA Today.

Lions Clubs around the world are committed to assisting those individuals needing to improve their personal vision. As a result, Lions are involved with a multitude of specific programs to address that goal.

One such venture is the Folsom Prison Vision Project for the Visually Impaired. Thousands of used eyeglasses are refurbished annually by skilled

inmates at Folsom Prison, cataloged and shipped by Lions Clubs to needy people around the globe.

The Colfax Lions have long been financial and used eyeglass donors to the Folsom Vision Project. The Colfax Lions find inspiration in their visits to the prison project and are initiating a more robust, international effort to improve the sight of hundreds of eyeglass recipients.

Dr. Worrall and his wife, Rozlynn, are veteran world travelers and have been the Colfax connection for dona-

ation (CFA) with the stipulation that the vehicles be removed from city property within 60 days. That hasn't happened because the CFA hasn't been able to find affordable alternative storage. The agreement allows continued storage of the vehicles on city property as long as space is available, and the city and fire trucks are insured for liability and limited operation as showpieces.

- The council approved a contract not to exceed \$16,000 for the exterior re-painting of the depot and city hall.

## Cannabis public workshop, 12/11/19

The entire council was present at two-hour public cannabis workshop at city hall on the morning of December 11. The city manager and city attorney were also on hand, as was Jim Dion, the city's only current medical cannabis retailer. The workshop closed following unanimous consensus by the council to continue working with SCI Consulting group via a one-year, \$25,000 contract to review the city's current cannabis ordinance and conduct a regulatory fee study that will include recovery of all costs to the city. The SCI representative at the workshop estimated having something for the council to review by late Spring 2020.

## The city's new broadcast system

The December 11 city council meeting also debuted a new broadcast and recording system that city manager Wes Heathcock said has been under development for six months. He said the hardware and installation was purchased for \$4,000. The contract with BoxCast, a live video streaming service, to send council meeting video to YouTube.com and to the city's Web site at **colfax-ca.gov** will cost the city \$1,200 a year. The two-camera system will also allow viewers at home to see any Power Point screen presentation being given in the council chambers. The system will allow archiving council meeting video on BoxCast for 90 days and indefinitely on YouTube.



tions abroad. He is a former Professor of Optometry at UC Berkeley and private practitioner in Colfax for 30 years, she is a retired teacher and former administrator at the California Department of Education.

After retiring 10 years ago, the Worralls began an around the world adventure by sailing their sailboat from San Francisco to Australia, and then continuing around the world by train, bus, and plane returning to San Francisco in 2015.

To date, they have visited nearly 90 countries, volunteered their skills and donated eyeglasses and school supplies in needy regions around the world. They are also active members of SERVAS and Friendship Force International that strive to build peace through understanding and friendship.

On a recent trip to Madagascar the Worralls went on a private National Geographic Expedition. Their guide, Floris, and driver were local Malagasy from Northern Madagascar.

Floris is a public school teacher who supplements his income by guiding National Geographic tours. The Worralls, who are used to bringing modest supplies of reading glasses and school supplies to developing and needy countries, asked their guide if there would be an opportunity to personally distribute the glasses.

The answer was a resounding yes and it was quickly apparent that the need was a million times greater than the supplies the Worralls had on hand.

Upon return to the United States, the Worralls prepared a package of 250 pairs of read-

ing glasses from the Folsom Vision Project and 200 sets of pens and pencils to ship back to Floris in Madagascar. The Colfax Lions paid the expensive postage and handling fee for the small precious package. It took two months for the package to make it back to Madagascar.

In addition to a heartfelt "thank-you" to the Worralls and the Colfax Lions Club, Floris included a handwritten list and several photos of the specific individuals who had received glasses or school supplies.

A second package was prepared by the Colfax Lions Club and of this writing, is en route to Madagascar. In addition to more reading glasses, school supplies and an American flag, two pairs of prescription glasses were donated by Foreman Eye Care in Auburn. As a small "thank-you" to Floris, the Worralls sent him a laser pointer so that he could locate local lemurs at night for tour clients, and a small solar light so that he can read at night with his reading glasses.




"We are excited to move forward with a unified look and feel that we think represents both our past and our future." noted City Manager, Wes Heathcock. Pamela Biery of
