Amtrak Cuts California Zephyr Service Due To COVID-19 Impacts On Employees

California Zephyr train service has been suspended from Denver west to Emeryville. During the coronavirus crisis there will only be train service between Chicago and Denver.

Under Amtrak policy, employees are directed to take time-off from service to care for themselves or family members who are symptomatic or have tested positive. A resulting lack of sufficient staff is causing the temporary suspension of Amtrak service on the western leg of the California Zephyr.

- Customers between Galesburg and Denver can continue west via an Amtrak Thruway Bus connection from Denver to the Southwest Chief at Raton.
- Customers between Emeryville and Reno can ride a combination of Amtrak trains and Thruway buses via Sacramento.

Amtrak CEO Stephen Gardner said passengers should expect these significant reductions in train service “to continue for some time.”

COVID-19 Crisis Forces SVC To Close Its Doors

In accordance with the governor’s statewide shutdown order, the Sierra Vista Community Center has closed its doors to the public for the duration of the COVID-19 pandemic crisis.

Some services will still be available, however, including:

- All rental requests will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis
- The commercial kitchen can still be rented by businesses and individuals.
- The community garden will continue and plots are available
- The farmers market is still expected to start in the spring
- The SVC board is considering starting a free, weekly outdoor book exchange, because the library is closed. Book donations will be needed to start the program.

All phone calls to the center at 346-8726 or 346-8626 will be returned.




The Mayor's Corner

3/25/2020 - Our congressman, Doug LaMalfa, has sent out an urgent message to his 1st District constituents that we all need to keep hearing about the growing coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

The only way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus because there is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).



Unfortunately, that means treating each other like potential carriers, but that's what we all are right now. Please don't take my six-foot no-contact zone personally.

The Center for Disease Control also strongly recommends everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory diseases, including:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.

- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.
- Facemasks: CDC does not recommend that people who are well wear a facemask to protect themselves from respiratory diseases, including COVID-19. Facemasks should be used by people who show symptoms of COVID-19 to help prevent the spread of the disease to others. The use of facemasks is also crucial for health workers and people who are taking care of someone in close settings (at home or in a health care facility).
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom, before eating, and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. Always wash hands with soap and water, lathering for a minimum of 20 seconds.

April Council Meetings to Be Teleconferenced

- The April 8 city council meeting will be via teleconference. The tele-conference will include viewing via the city broadcast system and a dial-in number for public/elected participation.

- The April 22 council meeting was up in the air as of this writing.


The council's March 11 meeting included a presentation by Retail Strategies proposing a program to increase sales tax revenues in the city. The program would cost \$35,000/yr., which the council will consider at a future meeting. After that, in quick order the council unanimously approved:

- Authorizing the city manager to contract with PlaceWorks Consulting Group for \$207,087 to prepare the General Plan and Housing Element update. SB2 grant funding totaling \$160,000 is going into this project, and staff is also pursuing additional grant monies to offset remaining project costs.

- An amendment to the round-about Construction Management and Inspection contract in the amount of \$55,788.78. Despite the change, the project is still \$145,000 under budget.

- The second reading of Ordinance 541 requiring hazardous vegetation abatement and establishment of defensible space, enforcement of said ordinance to begin in January 2021.

At this time, we are well aware of the precautions we need to take personally. How can we help others?



ABSOLUTELY no hazardous waste


Refuse exceeding the limit will not be picked up.




Large Appliances must be taken to the City Corporation Yard for disposal



Five-Year Wet Season Averages Show Much More Rain Needed

March got off to a flying start with 6.75 inches of precipitation, including 5 inches of branch-busting snow, during the first half of the month.

That raised the rain-to-date total to a healthier 27.65 inches, although we are still running 6.5 inches behind the five-year average for late March. And unfortunately the forecast for the rest of the month indicates miniscule precipitation at best.

Speaking of that five-year average, we probably shouldn't be expecting an 'Awesome April' because from 2015-2019 average April rainfall never topped 4.9 inches. And if we take 2017 and its never-ending atmospheric river out of the calculation we end up with a four-year average of 3.6 inches in April.

Either way we could end up starting May, when the weather shifts from wetter to drier, with well under 35 inches on the season. As if we don't already have enough to worry about, flirting with another drought plus an early fire season would only increase the challenges we're already facing in 2020.
